Dr Raffaella Ravinetto, PharmD, PhD, with long term experience in commercial and non-commercial clinical research, humanitarian organizations, and research ethics review, holds a University Master Degree in Pharmacy from the University of Torino, Italy; a Postgraduate Diploma in Tropical Medical Biology from the Institute of Tropical Medicine (ITM), Antwerp, Belgium; and a PhD in Biomedical Sciences from the KU Leuven, Belgium.

Following experience as Clinical Research Scientist in the private pharmaceutical sector, she worked as a pharmacist in emergency and development programs run by different NGOs in the Balkans and in Africa. She is currently a senior researcher and policy advisor at the Public Health Department of the ITM, in charge of a portfolio of research, policy support, networking, education and advocacy in pharmaceutical public health; and an extraordinary professor at the School of Public Health, University of Cape Town, South Africa. She is the chairperson of the ITM Institutional Review Board; the chairperson of the MSF Ethics Review Board; and an associated editor of BMC Medical Ethics.

Her main areas of interest include pharmaceutical policies and access to quality-assured medicines, with a particular focus on the context of low- and middle-income countries; and research ethics, particularly in relation to resource-constrained settings and vulnerable populations. She was president of MSF Italy from 2007 to 2011.

Independent consultant – researcher and teacher - in bioethics and public health.

Dr Amar Jesani is one of the founders of the Forum for Medical Ethics Society and its journal *Indian Journal of Medical Ethics* (IJME www.ijme.in), published since 1993. Since 2012, he is its editor. He was one of the founding trustees (1991 to 2013) of the Anusandhan Trust, which manages CEHAT (Centre for Enquiry into Health and Allied Themes - www.cehat.org) in Mumbai, and SATHI (Support for Advocacy and Training to Health Initiatives - www.sathicehat.org) in Pune in India.

He is a Visiting Professor at the Ethics Centre, Yenepoya University, Mangalore, India (since 2011), an Associate Faculty at the Centre for Biomedical Ethics and Culture (CBEC) of the Sindh Institute of Urology and Transplantation (SIUT), Karachi, Pakistan (since 2010) a Visiting Faculty at the Kenya Medical Research Institute (KEMRI), Nairobi, Kenya (since 2017) and adjunct faculty at the Indian Institute of Public Health, Delhi (IIPH-D) of the Public Health Foundation of India (PHFI) (since

2007). In last one decade, he has served as a member of a dozen Research Ethics Committees in biomedical, social science and public health institutions in India. He is currently a member of the international Ethics Review Board (ERB) of the Medicine Sans Frontiers (MSF) (since 2009); and the National Apex Committee for Stem Cell Research and Therapy (NAC-SCRT) of the Government of India, New Delhi (since 2020).

In the past, he worked as Senior Researcher at the Foundation for Research in Community Health for 15 year (1979-95) and as the first Coordinator of the CEHAT (1994-99). He also worked (2001-03) as Program Coordinator at the Achutha Menon Centre for Health Sciences Studies (AMCHSS) in the Sree Chitra Tirunal Institute of Medical Sciences and Technology (SCTIMST), Trivandrum, and honorary Coordinator of the Centre for Studies in Ethics and Rights (2005-08). He coordinated a National Committee for Ethics in Social Science Research in Health to develop the "Ethical Guidelines for Social Science Research in Health", published in 2000. He has served as a resource person in several short courses in research bioethics, and as visiting faculty at several institutions - SCTIMST (2003-10), International Centre for Diarrhoeal Diseases Research, Bangladesh (ICDDRB) (2006-13), University of Philippines, Manila (2004-05), Indian Council of Medical Research (2003-12), the Public Health School of the SRM University, Chennai (2008-10), Tata Institute of Social Sciences in Mumbai (2008-10), etc.

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Yali Cong, MSc, PhD

Professor, Medical Ethics Program, Peking University Health Scienc Center, Beijing, China

Professor Yali Cong was trained in Biology in Beijing Normal University and in Philosophy in People's University, China. She has been engaged in medical ethics teaching and research in Peking University Health Science Center (PUHSC) since she obtained her PHD in 1995. She teaches medical ethics to clinical medical students and supervises graduate students. After the SARS epidemic in Beijing, Prof Cong and her colleagues in the school of public health in PUHSC initiated the public health ethics program. Since 2010 to 2021, she has been the Chair of the Institutional Review Board and has worked with other leaders to establish the first Human Subject Protection Program of Peking University. In 2008, she set up a joint center for medical professionalism with the Institute of Medicine as a Profession of Columbia University. The annual conference on medical professionalism is already an important academic activity in China. She serves as the chair of China Medical Ethics Association in 2019 and will finish her term by 2023. She has joined some international organizations of Bioethics, including WHO and IAB. To date, she has published about 50 papers in English and Chinese.

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Jantina de Vries, MSc, PhD

Associate Professor in Bioethics at the Department of Medicine of the University of Cape Town.

Dr. Jantina de Vries obtained her DPhil through The Ethox Centre at the University of Oxford (2011), and BSc- and MSc- equivalent degrees in sociology at Wageningen University (2003). She was at the European University Institute in 2003-2004 and has been at the University of Cape Town since 2011. Jantina's work focuses on developing ethical best practice for collaborative health research in Africa, with a particular emphasis on genomics and biobanking. Amongst others, she has contributed to developing an evidence base for best practice in informed consent for African genomics research, investigating ethical challenges relating to the sharing of African samples and data, exploring what constitutes fairness and equity in African research collaborations, and studying how genomic research may impact on stigma relating to disease. A second and equally important output relates to the translation of her work into forward-looking policies and best practice guidelines that are used in the regulation of genomics research in Africa.

Jantina co-directs the IFGENERA H3Africa ELSI Collaborative Centre and has received funding from the National Institutes of Health (NIH) in the US and the Wellcome Trust in the UK. She was the founding Chair of the H3Africa Working Group on Ethics (2013-2016) and is a member of: the World Health Organization Expert Advisory Board on Genome Editing, the Steering Committee of the Global Forum for Bioethics in Research, the H3Africa Steering Committee and the Advisory Board for the Center for ELSI Resources and Analysis (CERA) based at Stanford University. She also sits on Advisory Boards for a number of ongoing international genomics research and ethics training projects. She is an Ethics and Science Reviewer for the European Commission. Jantina is a regular reviewer of funding applications for national and South African funding organizations and has reviewed manuscripts for many science and ethics journals.

Dr. Doris Schopper obtained her medical degree at the University of Geneva, Switzerland and trained as specialist in Internal Medicine (accredited by the Swiss Medical Association). During her specialty training, she spent several years with Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF) in the field. She completed a Doctor in Public Health at the Harvard School of Public Health in 1992 and went on to work as health policy adviser in the Global Programme on AIDS at the WHO headquarters in Geneva for four years. She was president of the Swiss branch of MSF (1991-1998) and twice president of the MSF International Council during this period. Further international work includes two years as senior health policy adviser at the Swiss Tropical Institute and developing several policies and strategies for WHO. Prof Schopper has also been responsible for the development of health policies and strategies at the national and regional level in Switzerland, including the Swiss National Cancer Control Programme 2005-2010; a framework to prevent obesity at the national level; and a comprehensive health policy for the canton of Geneva.
